With course selection quickly approaching, many students find themselves lost in the deluge of options offered at St. Andrew's. From AP human geography to environmental science, anatomy and physiology to AP European history, there is no shortage of fascinating and rigorous classes available at St. Andrew's, covering a diverse range of study, including the humanities, sciences, world languages, and mathematics. However, with a myriad of choices for the upcoming school year, which classes do students recommend?

"The class I learned the most from was probably Mrs. Holmes's AP English 11," Senior Meg Case said. "She expanded my horizons while studying literature, and it was interesting to see how much I had learned going into AP English this year."

Case explains that the courses that she learned the most from were often among her favorites. Furthermore, her favorite class, anatomy and physiology, is no sinecure either.

"My favorite class was Honors Physics because I found the subject material intriguing." Senior Matt Harjes said. "The hardest class I've taken is AP physics C which is the physics class I'm in now."

Harjes regards honors physics as his favorite class, which, like AP English 11, is

acknowledged as one of the more difficult SA courses available to juniors. Similar to Case, Harjes chose a class that challenged him as his favorite, rather than an easy one. Both Case and Harjes note that their interest in the course material catalyzed their love for the class, meaning that easy classes are not necessarily students' favorites.

The graph below shows the results from a survey of juniors and seniors about their favorite classes. Honors chemistry, biology, and AP English 11 ranked first, second, and third respectively. Honors chemistry is greatly beloved for its former instructor, Dr. Stribling. Meanwhile, biology, taught by Mrs. LaFon, is regarded as one of the most fascinating and enjoyable classes at St. Andrew's. Rounding out the top three, Mrs. Holmes's AP English 11 is infamous for its rigger, yet loved for its extensive exploration of literature and rhetoric. As course selection draws nearer, students should choose classes which interest them, even if they have a greater workload than the alternatives. Moreover, students should find a happy medium of demanding, laborious courses and less stressful ones. Regardless of what classes students choose to take this upcoming school year, there is certainly no shortage of options at St. Andrew's.

**ZOOLOGY** — Begining next year, the new chemsitry teacher Mr. McWhorter will be offering a zoology course, which will include a trip to the zoo!




#### LANGUAGE SPOTLIGHT
