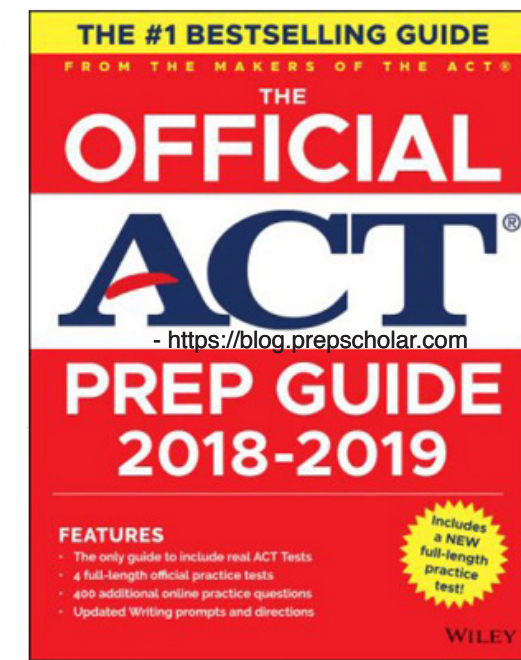


DO NOT FORGET AN ERASER!
